Congratulations & celebrations

Heritage Lottery Fund Bid (HLF)

WE were thrilled to learn in late September that the HLF had awarded Gissing a Delivery Phase grant following our application in June 2016. These funds will enable us to repair the collapsing vestry wall, lead roofs, undertake urgent work on the tower parapet, improve the drainage and carry out other essential repairs and restorations required for the building.

- The grant will also enable Gissing to:
- upgrade the electricity supply
- install an efficient and effective heating system
- upgrade the lighting system, including illuminating the angel roof
- promote the heritage of the building in order to attract increased numbers of visitors
- be able to use the building more for community events

A team of people, in addition to the HLF Project Group, will be involved in the work programme, which is due to start in February 2017, and comprises the church architect, archaeologist, historian, conservator (monuments), quantity surveyor, bat conservation person, structural engineer, and a principle designer, as well as UK Power Networks, and heating and lighting experts.

Whilst recognising that work is needed to save the Grade I listed church from further structural decline, the HLF expect to see greater efforts put into promoting the church as a place to attract visitors, and as a venue for broader community events, other than weekly services. Therefore, the heritage related Activity Plans are also a key aspect of the grant. They include the promotion of the church via the website www.fogchurch.org.uk development of new leaflets and guides, storyboards, a series of talks on the history of the church and its place in the village, and opportunities for adults and children to learn about the history and symbolism contained



within the monuments and not least the amazing angel roof. It also includes developing a conservation churchyard, with help and advice from Norfolk Wildlife Trust, which will set aside areas to protect rare wild flowers and plants.

As part of the promotion of the angel roof Gissing will become part of the Norwich Diocese 'Angel Trail'. Michael Rimmer, the author of Angel Roofs of East Anglia, described the church as a 'Faberge Egg' of a church and the rare roof as being one of only 4 in the region and 32 in the whole country. Despite our success in receiving the HLF Delivery Phase funding there was still a shortfall of funds necessary to complete the entire project, as the HLF never awards 100% grants. Therefore, other charities were contacted to seek their help. We have been fortunate in securing grants from 10 other charities including the Norfolk Churches Trust and the Round Tower Churches Society. A full list is available if anyone wishes to see it.

We have not lost sight of the longer-term ambition set out in our 'Vision' document showing imaginative plans to provide a mains water supply, toilet and kitchenette, all of which would enable the church to be used for a far greater range of community activities during the whole year. However, the focus in the programme starting in February has to be on dealing with the urgent repairs, securing a better electricity supply/heating/lighting, and being more effective in promoting the undoubted heritage in the building.

NOME people might ask why, now we still need to continue our local fund raising? Well, the award of an HLF grant represents only the capital costs (ring-fenced and closely scrutinised) for the repairs and restoration project and does not cover the routine 'year-on-year' expenses of keeping the church open and safe. Improved lighting and heating may mean an increase in running expenses so fund raising will need to continue. This is why we still need to ask you for your on-going support through Friends' membership, donations and support at events. Spring/Summer events



- In February, Janet Sleep led a planting party to start the development of a 'Snowdrop Trail' around the village. The first plants were placed in the churchyard and the lower section of Rectory Road. There will be further planting parties in February 2017, and subsequent years, to eventually complete the trail.
- Janet has also continued to hold Plant Heritage events during the year and has raised much appreciated funds (£491) for the Friends contingency fund in the process.
- April saw the annual 'Gorgeous Gissing Litter Pick' – this is not a fund raiser but designed to be a community event. We had a good turnout of volunteers and this year we won the £200.00 prize draw!! Everyone seemed to enjoy the satisfaction of cleaning up the area as well as the scrumptious tea provided by Dave Smith and Moira Walters.
- April also saw the Friends Annual General Meeting when we were able to set out the details of the second stage bid.
- In May, the Friends invited the author of the 'Angel Roofs of East Anglia' (Michael Rimmer) in which Gissing's roof is featured, to give a talk to the village. The church was packed with over 100 people from the village and well beyond. After the talk, wine and cheese were provided by the Friends and Claire Calton Moore, to an appreciative audience. ■ In June, Moira Walters organised a Table Top Sale in the village hall with stalls for the Friends, Heart of Gissing, Garden Club and Greyhound Rescue. The Friends stall staffed by Veronica Manly and Sandra Worthington sold second hand clothes and funds were also raised through refreshment sales (£86). Many thanks go to all who provided cakes and pastries for this and for their donations. **On 30 July**, a Friends Bar-B-Q was held at Keeper's Cottage by kind invitation again of Tony and Heidi Baxter. It was a really enjoyable evening for everyone attending and guests showed their appreciation with some very generous donations. Ed and Denise Scoggins helped Tony and Heidi with preparing for, running and clearing up after, the party. Many thanks go also to Clive Homer, Ellie Jennings and her son Theo and his girlfriend Nia who ran a very busy bar and cocktail bar all evening. Alex Hudson ran his ever popular 'Night at the Races'!!,



supported by Joe Cromley and Stuart Dobson provided the all-important loos for that 'one pint too many'! Thank you to all involved with this event especially those who lent much needed hands with the preparation and clearing away. From all this effort, the Bar-B-Q raised a fantastic \pounds 1,810. This was our major fund raising contribution towards the contingency we need as part of the HLF Grant conditions.

- In August, the Friends had a stall at the Gissing Summer Fete on Bank Holiday Sunday, which was organised by the Heart of Gissing. Everyone enjoyed the stalls, entertainment and refreshments and the rain held off until packing-up time which was good if not for those dismantling the stalls! A steady stream of visitors supported the Friends purchasing items from our stall.
- A further $\pounds 125$ was secured via donations during August.

Autumn/Winter events

- September saw two hardy souls set out on the 'Stride & Ride Day', the annual sponsored cycle ride around the churches. This year Veronica Manly walked around the local 6 parishes, at times accompanied by friends including Pat Hutchins and raised an amazing £500. Paul Wright cycled around the Broads area visiting 25 churches and raised £380. Well done to them both.
- **October** The HLF project required a big effort on the part of the Project Team with meetings every 6 weeks so it was a relief to hear that the bid had been successful. Even though the building work will not begin until February 2017, we decided to make a start on the Heritage related activities. We organised a photography weekend in the church to which historians, professional photographers and the press were invited. Ed and Tom Scoggins, together with Malcolm Turton, (with his well-used trailer to transport it), and Paul Wright, assembled and moved a six-metre tower scaffold the full length of the aisle and back again, enabling the visiting professionals to get 'up close and personal' with the angel roof. The photography took all weekend and the hard work and time spent by all concerned was so much appreciated - it might have been the 'lost weekend' for the 'scaffolders' but the

results are fabulous. The amazing photos of the angels will be used for publicity materials and the increased understanding of the roof carvings will improve our information guides.

The Diss Express and the EDP published the success story and took photographs of the celebration at the Gissing Crown to which all Friends members, and other supporters in the village were warmly invited. The publicity complemented the earlier success for the Heart of Gissing Big Lottery Fund grant for the new community building, the development of

which is well underway now. Between the Heart of Gissing and the PCC/Friends, the village will be having almost $\pounds 1$ million pounds of investment to provide a new community centre and a safe and sound church for residents and visitors alike. In fact, the Heart of Gissing Trustees and the Friends/PCC will be joining together for a Christmas meal at the Gissing Crown on December 8th to celebrate this momentous year.

- Note and Christmas cards were kindly designed and printed for the Friends by Avril Pierssene during the summer and autumn showing new views of the church in different seasons. They have been selling well and we have gone to a reprint for the Christmas cards already which shows their popularity. - The St Nicholas Fayre, organised by the Heart of Gissing was held on Saturday, 3 December. The Friends had a stall selling pottery donated by Pat Cattell and handmade bracelets by Moira Walters, as well as the note and Christmas cards. At the time of writing we do not have the figures but would like to thank all those involved, especially Ed and Denise Scoggins, and all who supported the stall.

How and where the money goes

This last year has not been an ordinary year for the Friends especially with regard to financial matters. The payment of contractors engaged in the HLF 'Development Stage' and the reclaiming of VAT from the 'Listed Places of Worship Scheme' has led to a lot of work for the treasurer. Next year will be very much the same, only more so, as we navigate our way through the 'Delivery Stage'.

Perhaps this is a good time to explain where our income this year has come from and how it has been spent. To make it less complicated we have removed all HLF grant income and expenditure and shown only the income we ourselves have generated.


The pie chart for income shows that members' subscriptions, donations, fund raising events and recovery of gift aid bring in the majority of our money.


The second pie chart indicates how that money was spent. This includes the annual costs of keeping the building and its surrounds safe and secure churchyard maintenance, building insurance, regular maintenance costs (organ tuning, fire extinguishers etc), fund raising costs, administration costs and our contribution towards the work of the 'Development Stage' of the HLF project. Any surplus is being put into a contingency fund just in case the work next year costs more than we are currently anticipating. If that money is not required it will

remain in the contingency fund and be used for the next phase of work which will bring mains water, toilets, kitchenette and a performance area to the church.

In all we have done exceptionally well and are in a good financial position to tackle the challenges which next year will bring. Well done everyone.
